
These students have a lot of spirit. Some are in Student Council, band, choir classes, and numerous other clubs and organizations.

The students showed great participation and much needed spirit to support our teams during the Homecoming games.





We appreciate all of their services and assistance; the East Newton school district could not function without them.




National Honor Society



Different teams participated at Miami (NEO)-taking second place, Crowder, the Big 8 at Lamar-again placing second, and District also held at Lamar-placing fourth.










