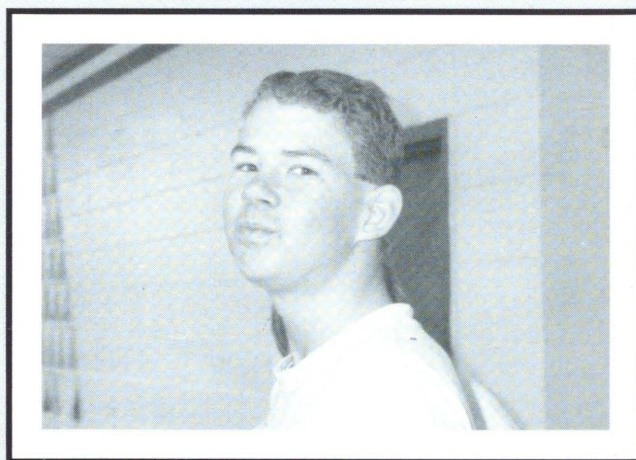

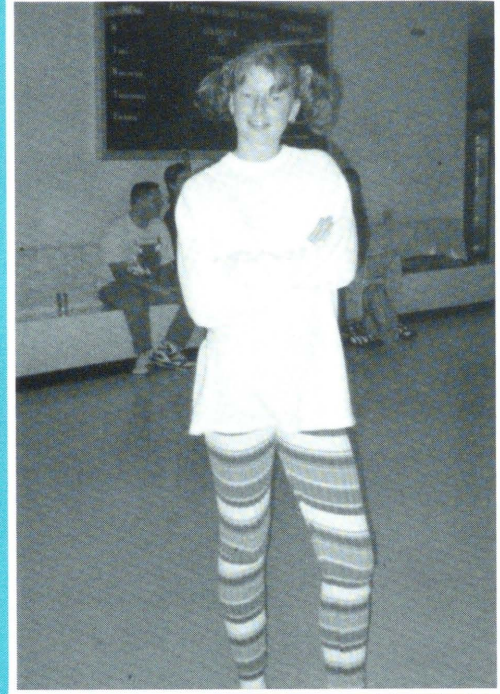
In Another World!!!!

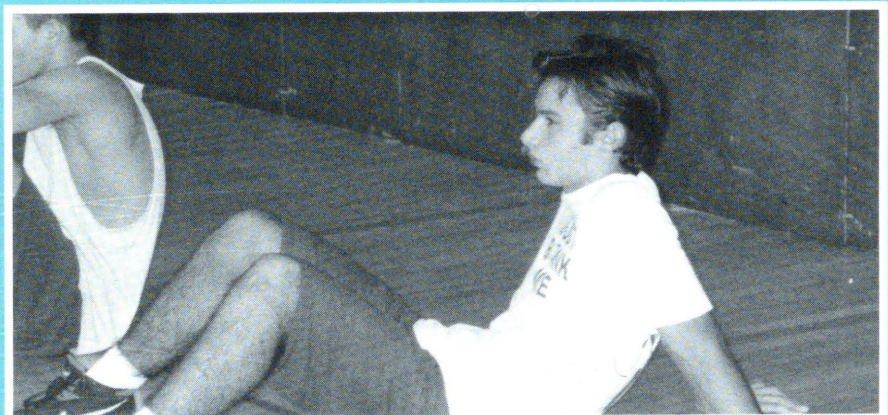

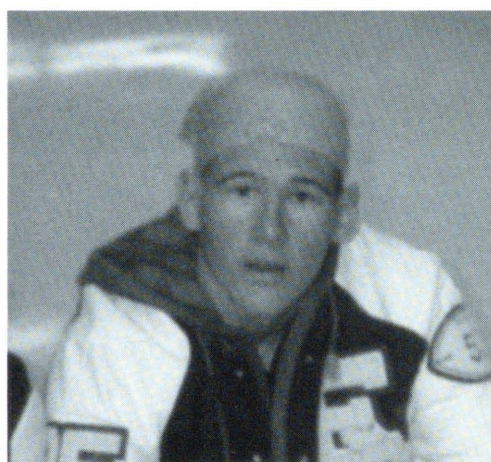

The 1993 FFA Barnwarming dance was held November 19 in the school cafeteria due to the 1992 fire that destroyed the agricultural building.

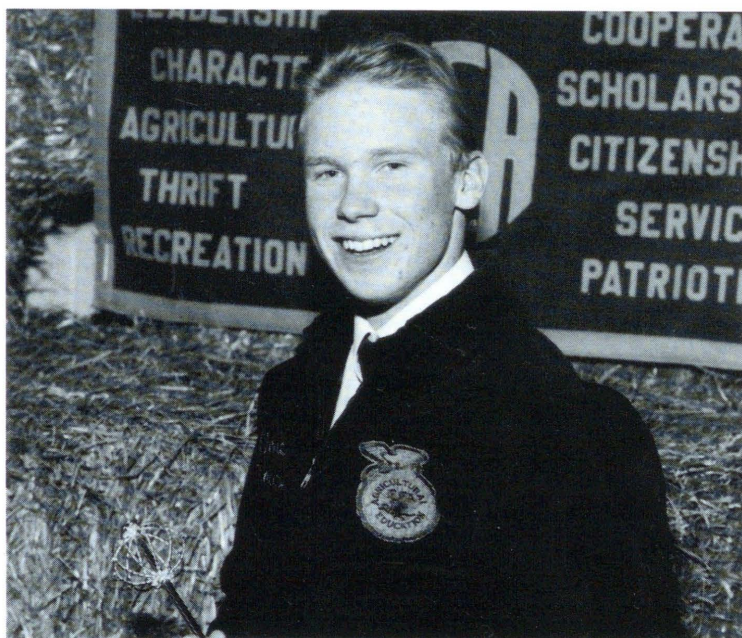
There was a new addition to this year's Barnwarming. Junior candidate Chris Brown was crowned East Newton's first ever Barnwarming king.

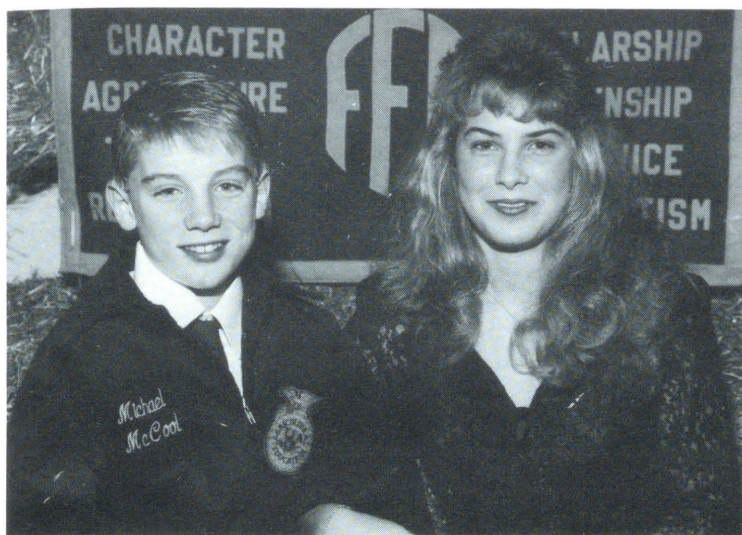

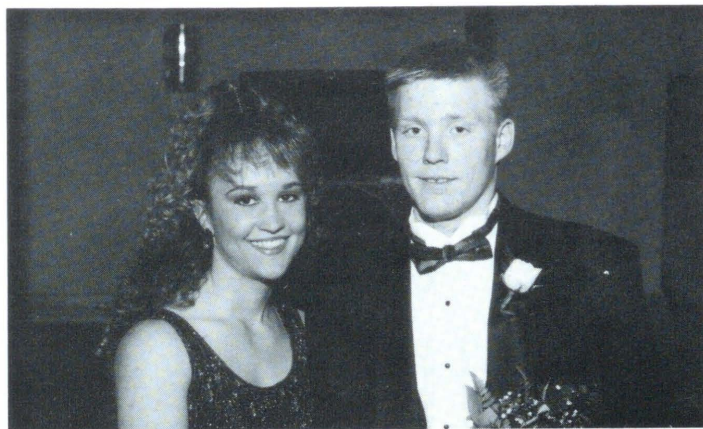

The board and administration are a crucial part of the East Newton school system. They make it a group effort to continue to improve our school year after year.

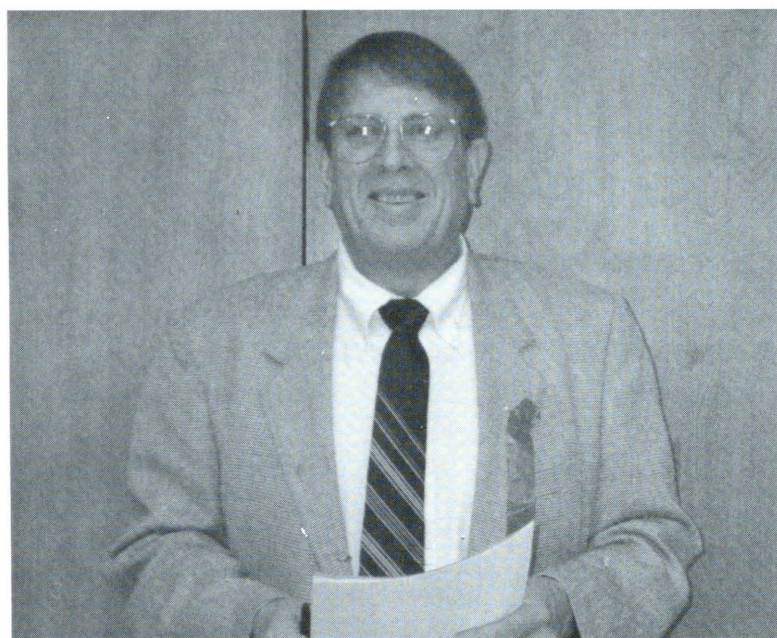
The seven-member board of education meets monthly to make decisions regarding the entire school district. Their service to the school district is time consuming and without pay.

For Their First Year At E.N.

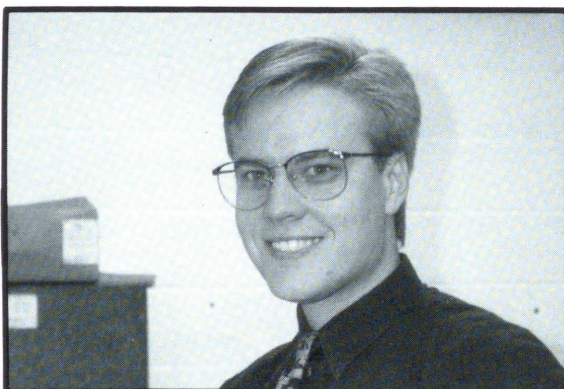

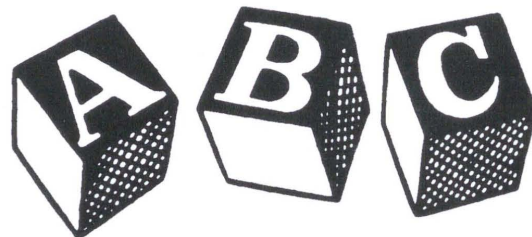

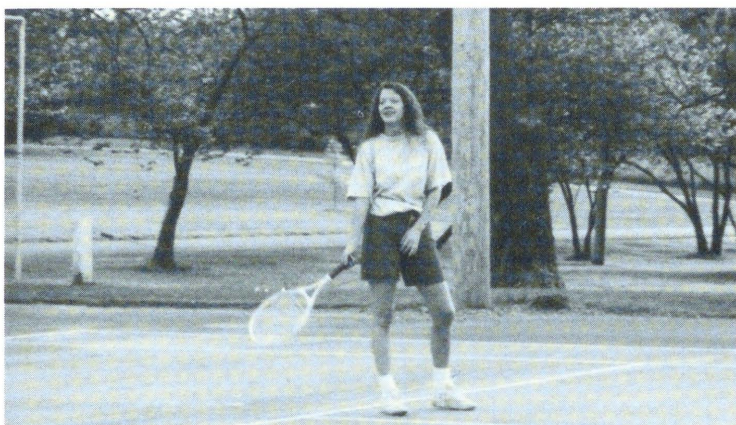

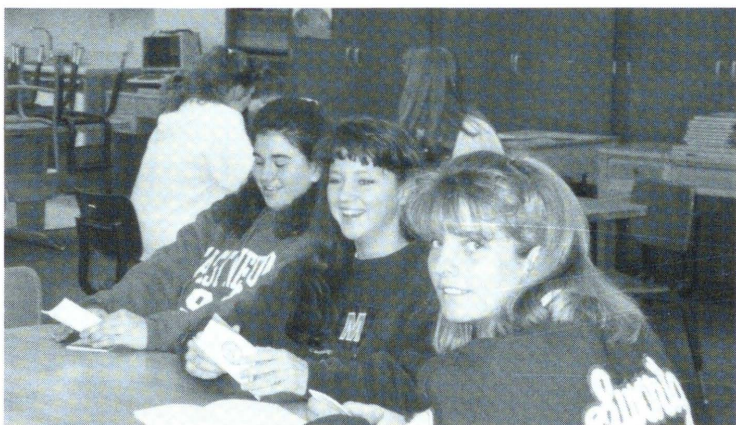

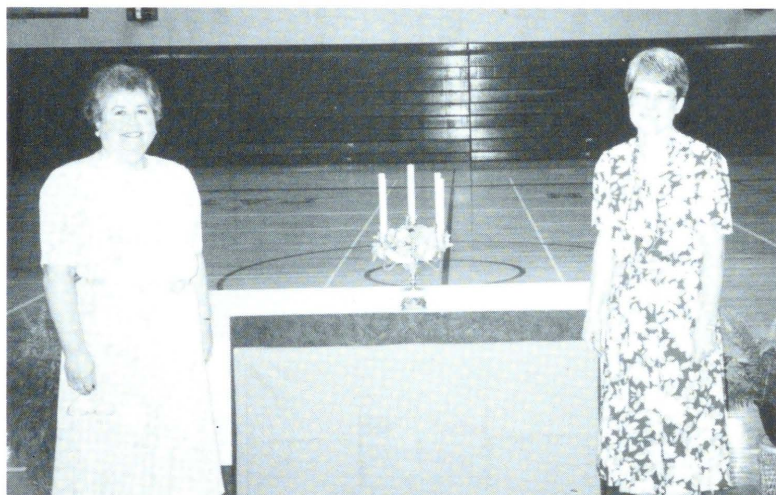
National Honor Society

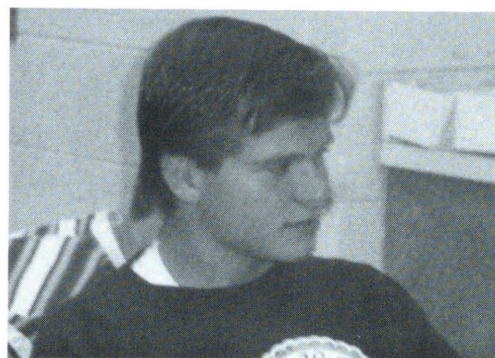
Quiz Bowl

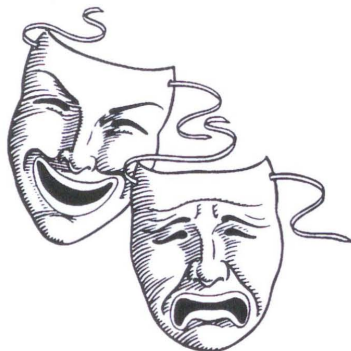

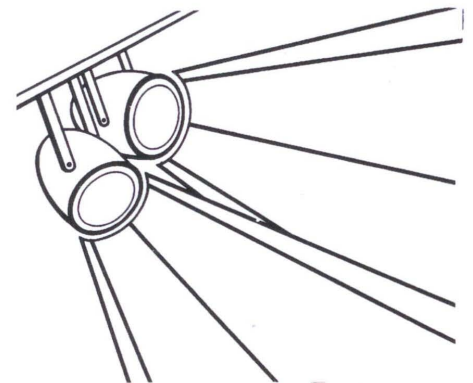

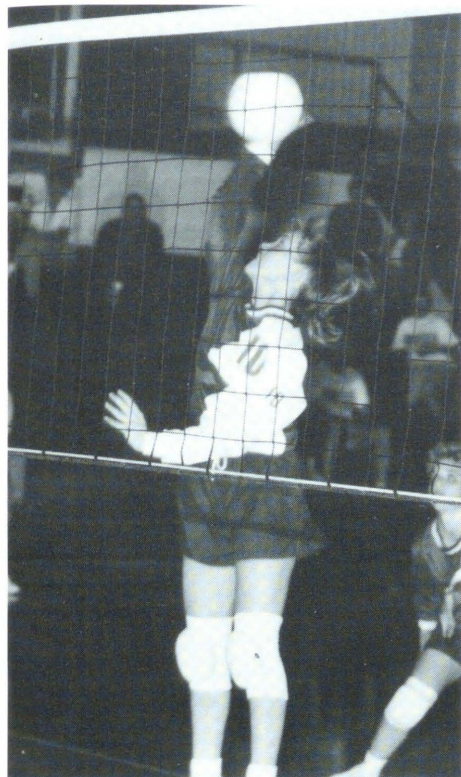

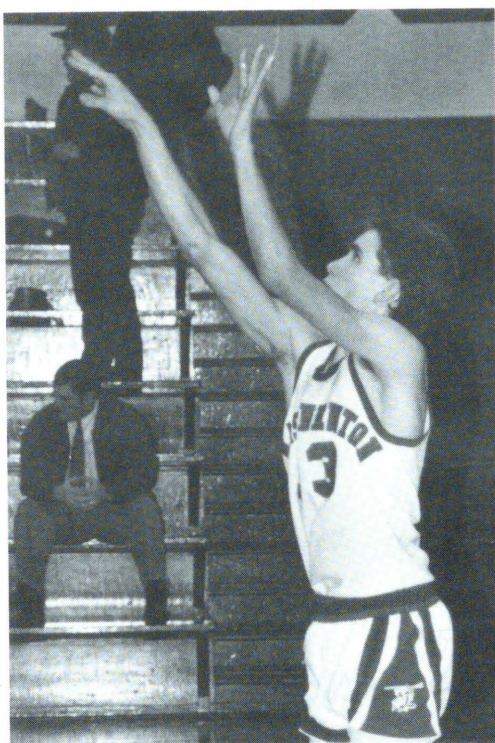

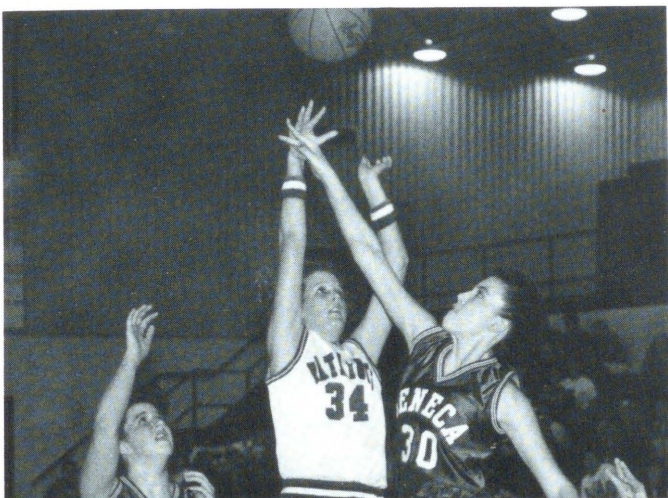

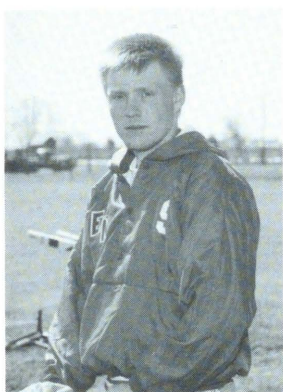

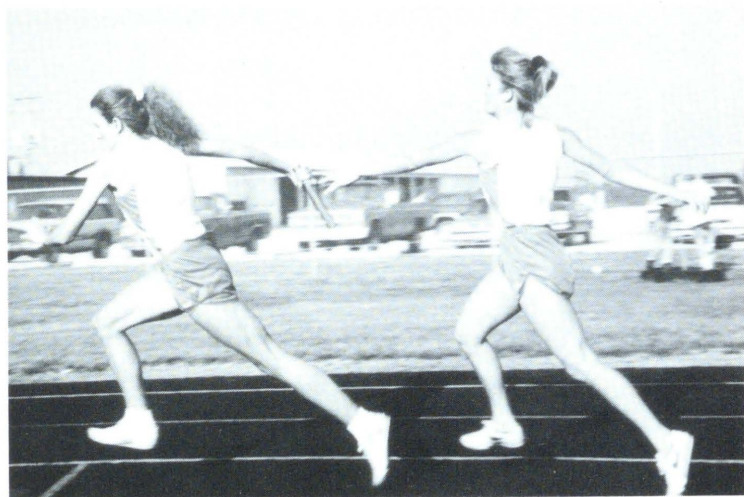

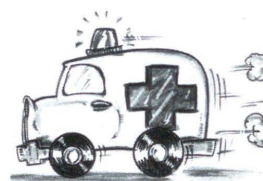

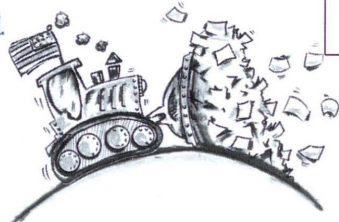
