



















Under the Neon Lights



A Midsummer Night's Dream


by Will Shakespeare







We will always have tomorrow.




















A Productive Year

Performances the choir had throughout the year included the Laymen's Pre-Christmas Service at the Methodist church, the Fall Festival and Baccalaureate.


Also they had their regular fall, spring, and contest concerts. Mr. Mike Straw is the director.


Future Farmers Building Tomorrows Today







National Honor Society Takes An Active Role






Thespian Club Has Great First Year




Lettermen Pave CATS' Way




Graduation 1981






