


As time goes by, we can always look back at the reflections of days gone by. Reflections of our four years at ENHS, that are captured forever on the pages of this yearbook.

Members of the yearbook staff selected two girls from each class to run for Yearbook


Queen.




The cooks, custodians, and mechanics make up a staff of special people that we have at East Newton. These people do the jobs that don't seem to get much recognition.


















CHEAPER BY THE DOZEN

Overall, the year was very fulfilling and the FHA accomplished much.






Shows Improvement

The JV squad gained much valuable experience and many essential skills this year. Their hard work and perserverence will be great assets when they return next year.





The team put up a good fight










This year's junior varsity and freshman basketball teams had a trying but still a very successful season.

Both Coach Lampshire and
















D. Ketcher, EN wrestling coach, said, "There was an overall effort by everyone,





and we plan on being better next year." The main thing Coach Ketcher emphasized was the fact that the boys had pride in their school and in their team.

Overall, the EN wrestlers improved a great deal, and they are hoping to improve even more in the future.











