## Language Arts Program for First Time in

Spanish was the foreign language course introduced in the language arts department this year. Thirty students enrolled in the class. Lately it has become apparent that as a nation we lack a highly necessary qualification: Proficiency in other peoples' languages; so it was felt the addition of
this course was a step in the right direction.
Four units of English were taught--three sections each for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors; two, for seniors. The importance of correct oral and written composition, as well as the basic fundamentals of our English language, were stressed; and
