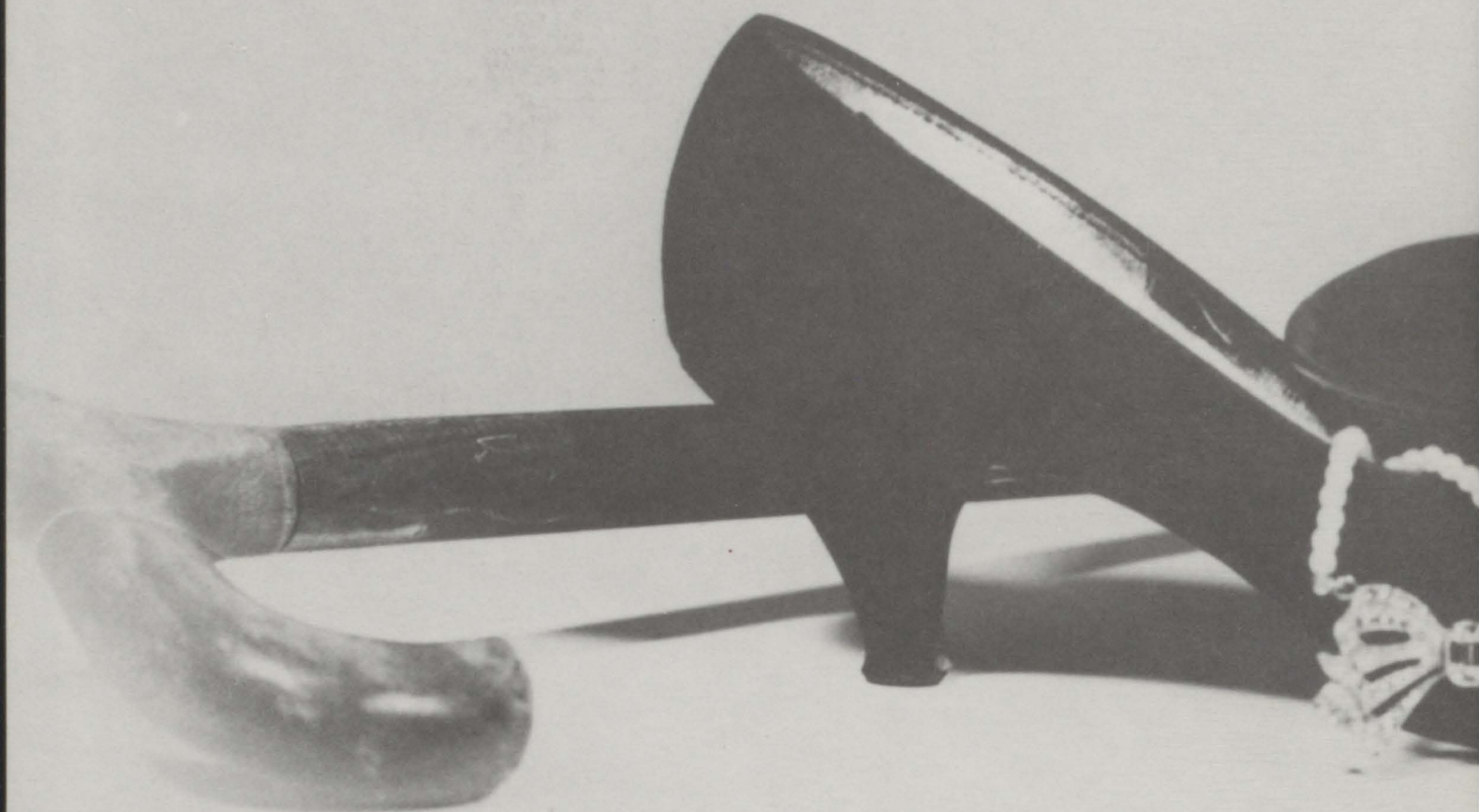


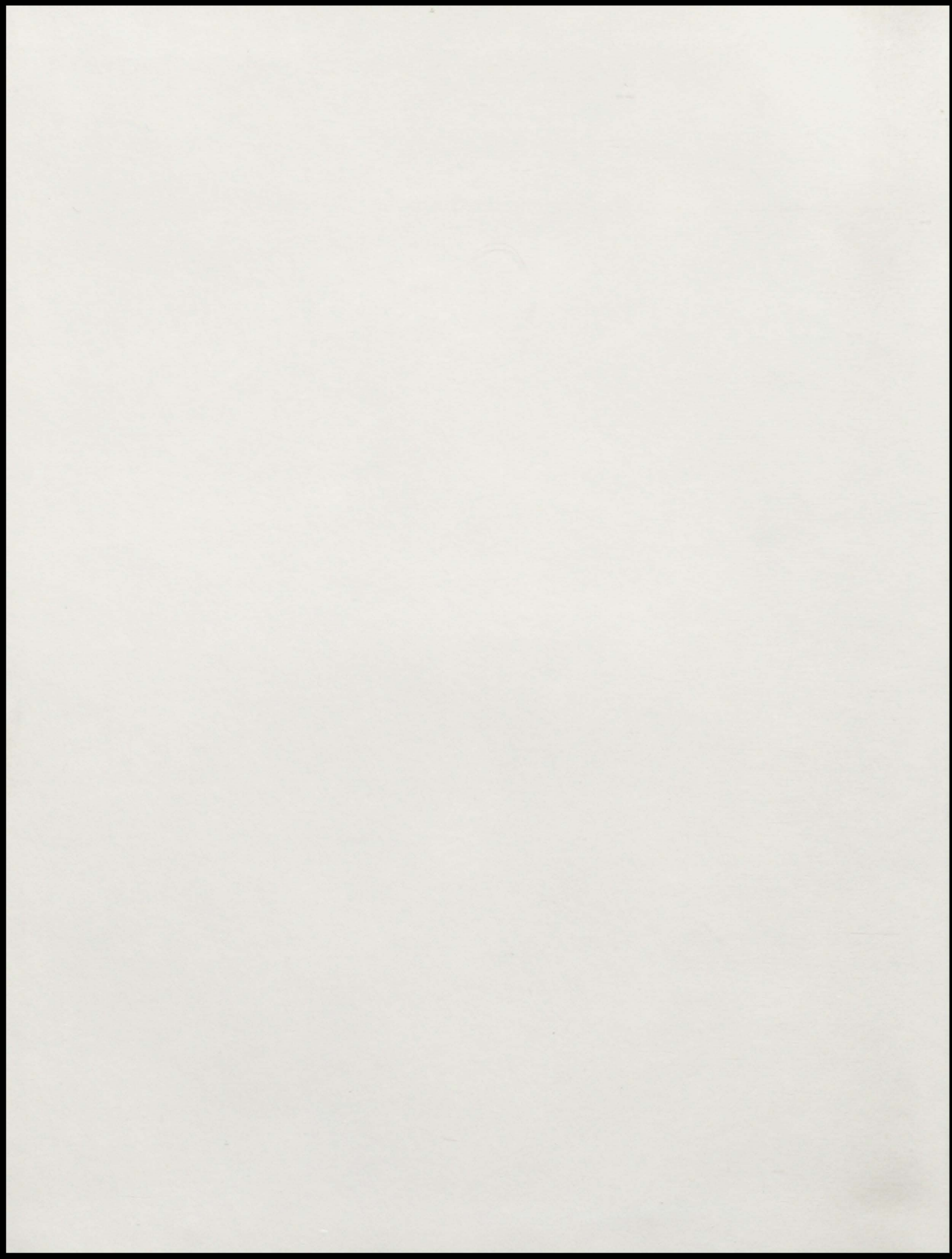


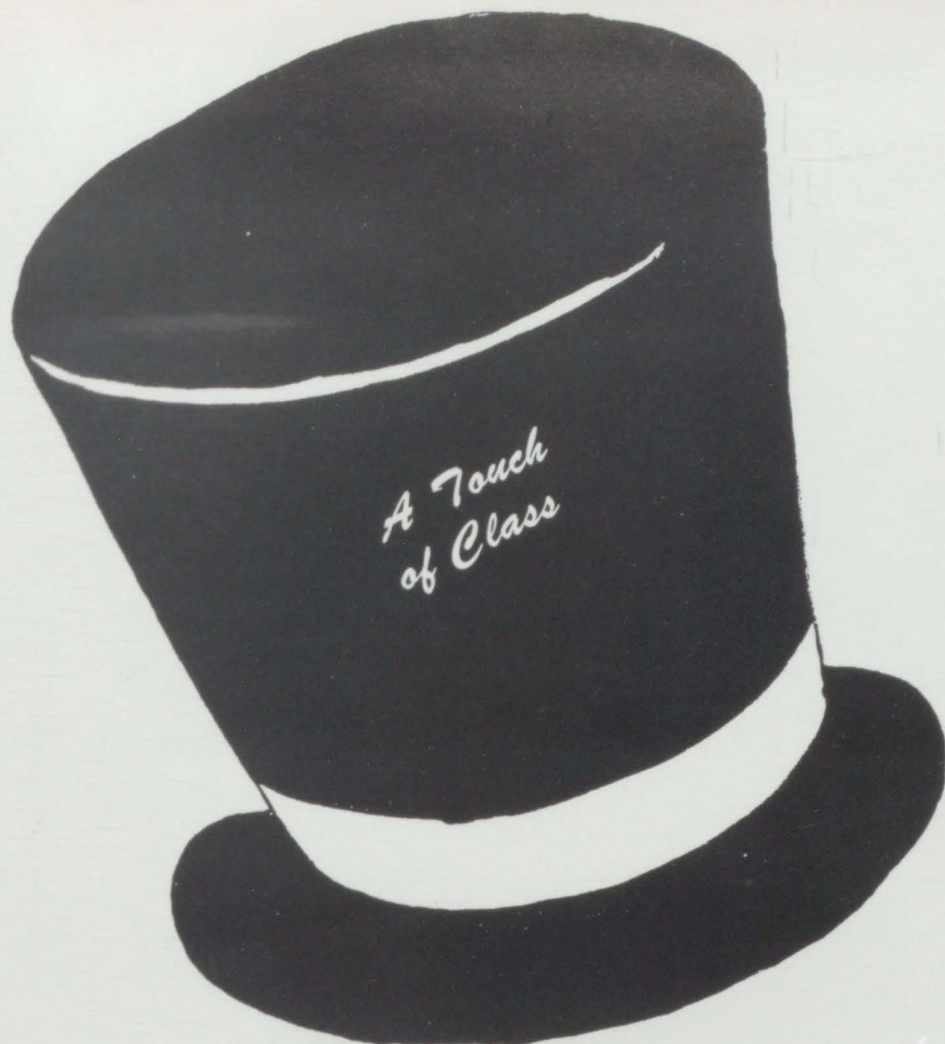

Academic Award

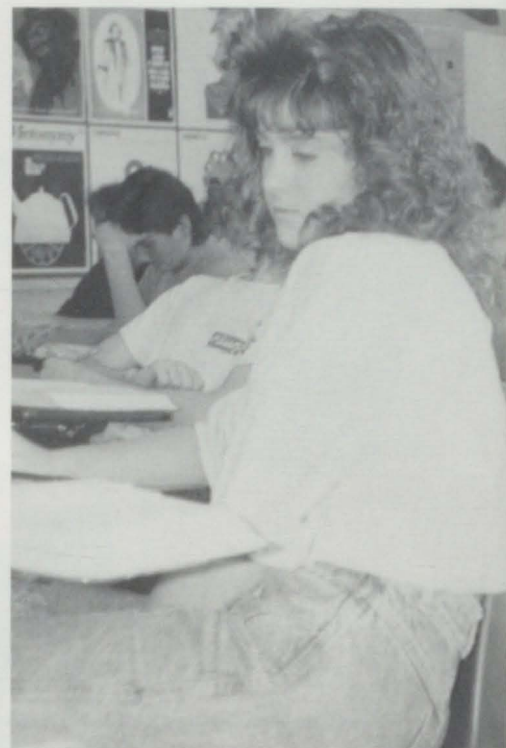

He or she also must be a full-time student attending seven classes a day. When Mr. Bill McEntire, high school principal, was asked if he felt that the program was improving throughout the years, he responded by saying, "I think it is improving each year, because more and more youngsters are in it. 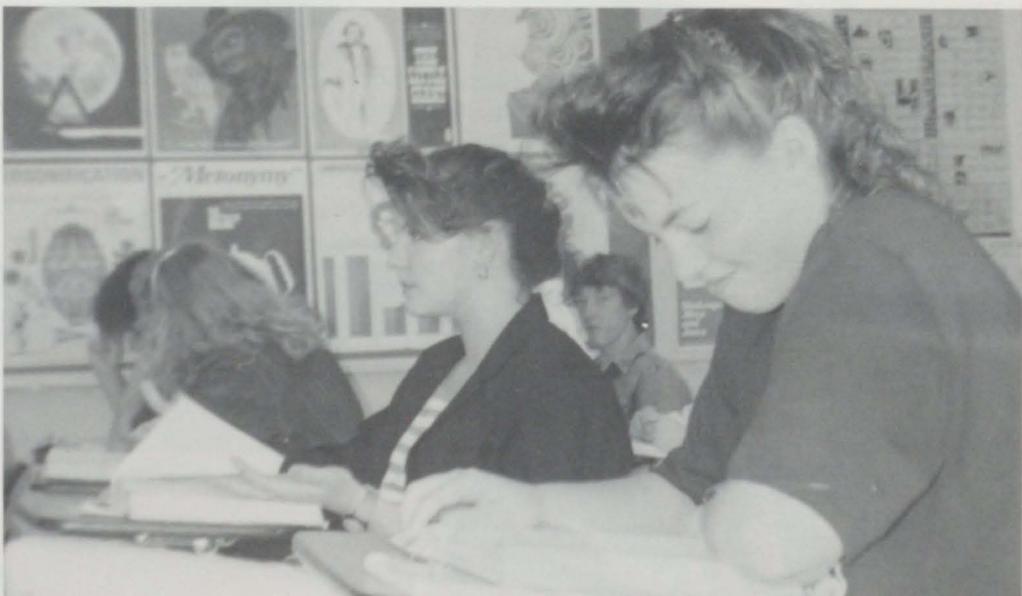

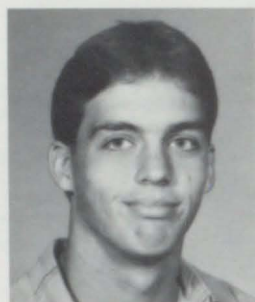


Students of the Month Are

After high school she plans to pursue a degree in Literature and Psychology at OCC or Pacific Christian College in Fullerton, California.



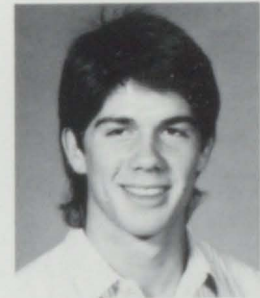



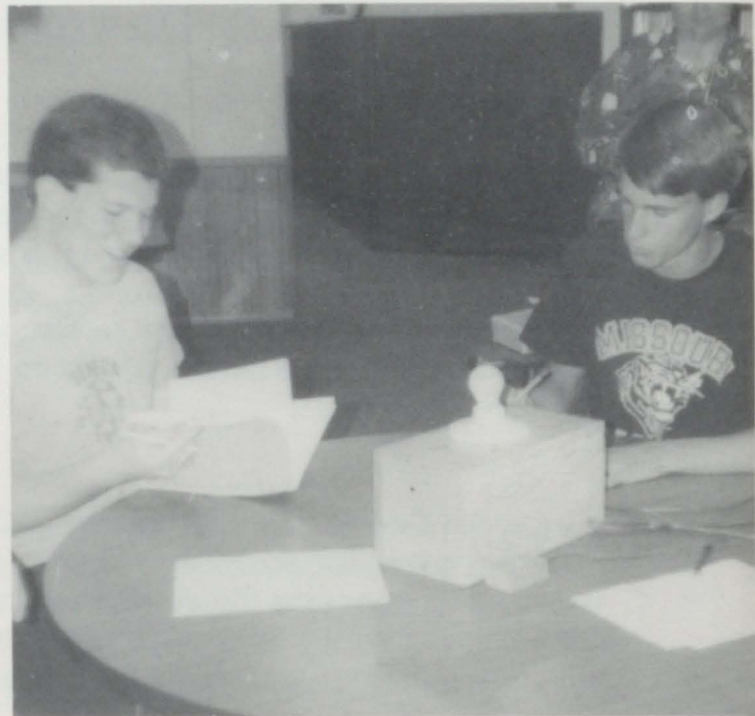

Knowledge Bowl



The original Seneca Knowledge Bowl, which began in the late 1960's, was discontinued in the late 1970's. In the Spring of 1985, Knowledge Bowl competitions were resumed. The main purpose of the Knowledge Bowl is to place academic achievement into a position of prestige. The rules of the Knowledge Bowl are as follows: accepting the first answer, using no material aids, no talking, and no applauding from the audience. The 1988-89 Bowl consisted of two opposing teams of four players each with a match lasting 20 minutes. The teams competed to see who had the most knowledge in the topics of government, history, current events, the arts, geography, language, literature, and general information. Mrs. Anne Shadwick, librarian, asked the questions and teachers served as judges, scorekeepers, and timekeepers.




Top left hand corner: Mrs. Shadwick asks questions during the fourth annual Seneca Knowledge Bowl.

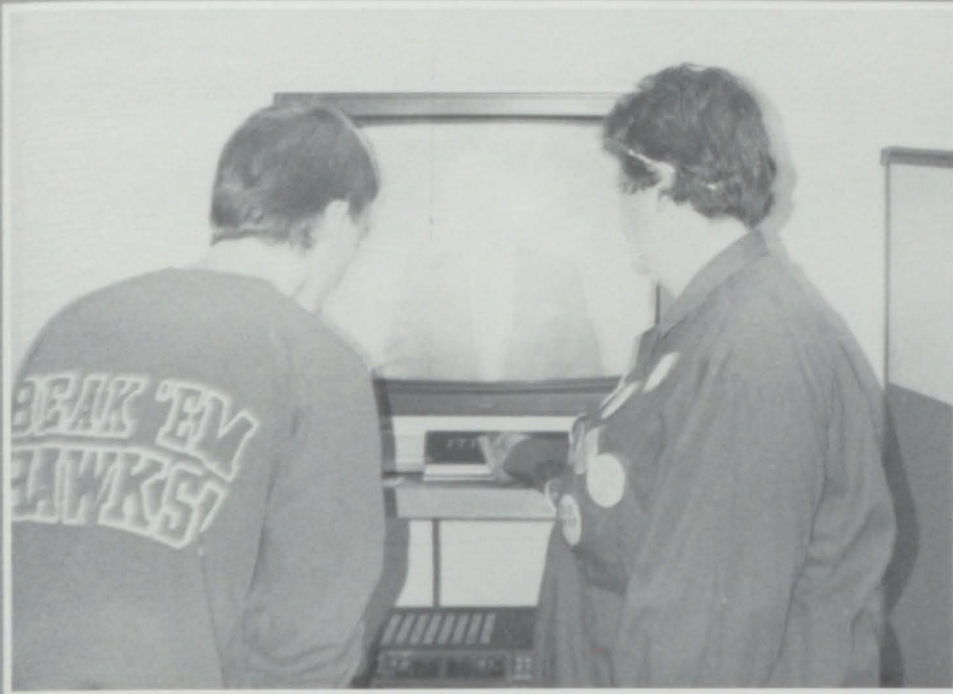

Math - An Important Tool

Presently at Seneca High School there are three math teachers, Laura Hampton, Randal Chicadonz, and Julie Heatherly. These teachers offer a variety of math courses. Mrs. Heatherly teaches basic math, Mr. Chicadonz also teaches basic math, geometry, Algebra II, and Consumer Math, while Mrs. Hampton has Algebra I, geometry, and advanced math. Any student, except a freshman, can put his math skills to use by being on the Math League. Students involved will be tested monthly at Missouri Southern State College. Twenty teams of 12 complete and those winning may receive a regent scholarship. Mrs. Hampton, who is in her fifth year of teaching math, stated, "Students need to take more math in high school because even though they think they're not going to use the math, they will use the analytical skills in life."

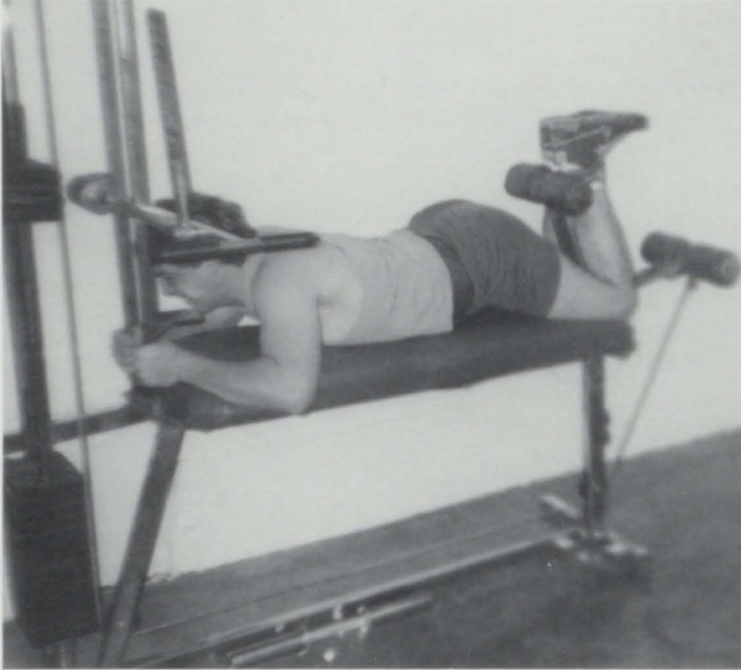
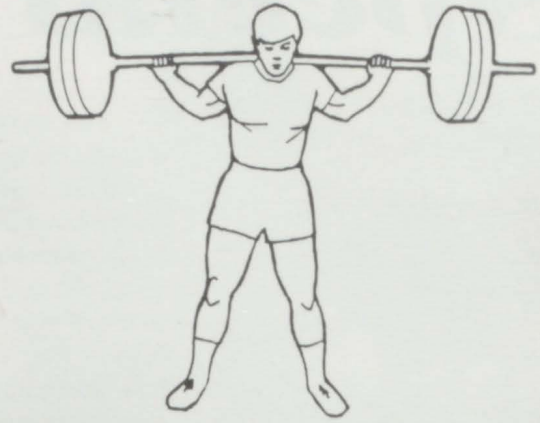

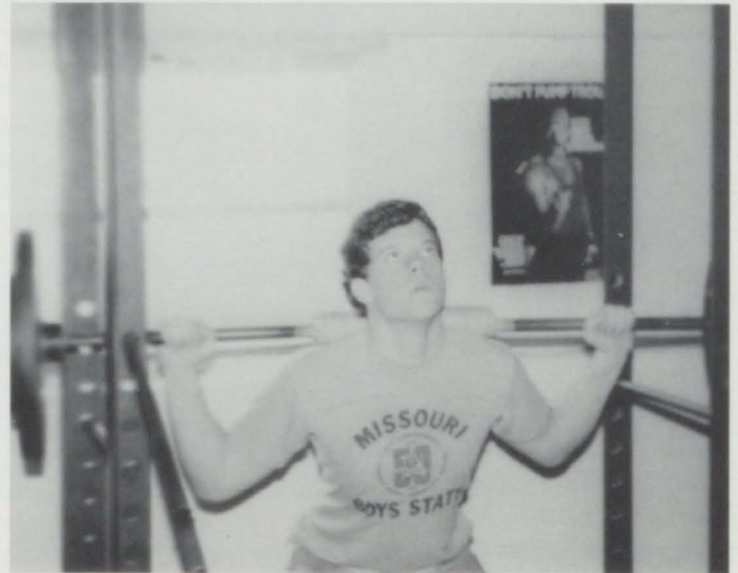
WEIGHTLIFTING

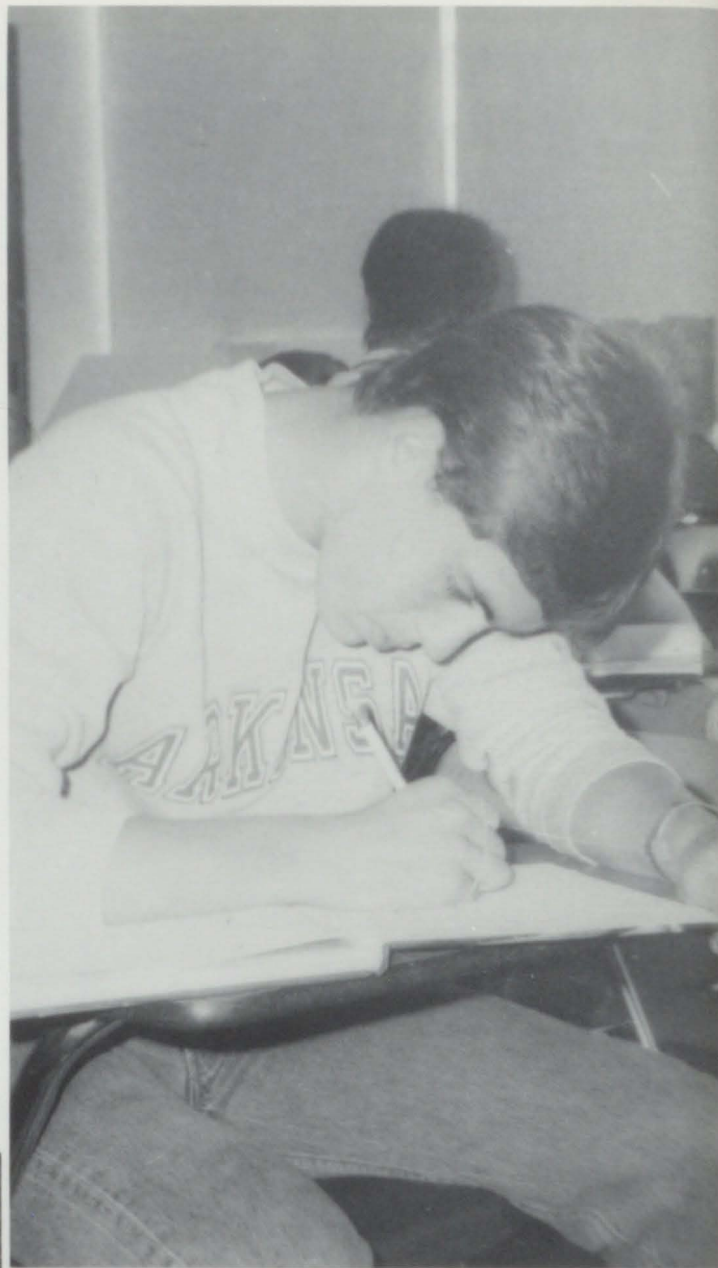

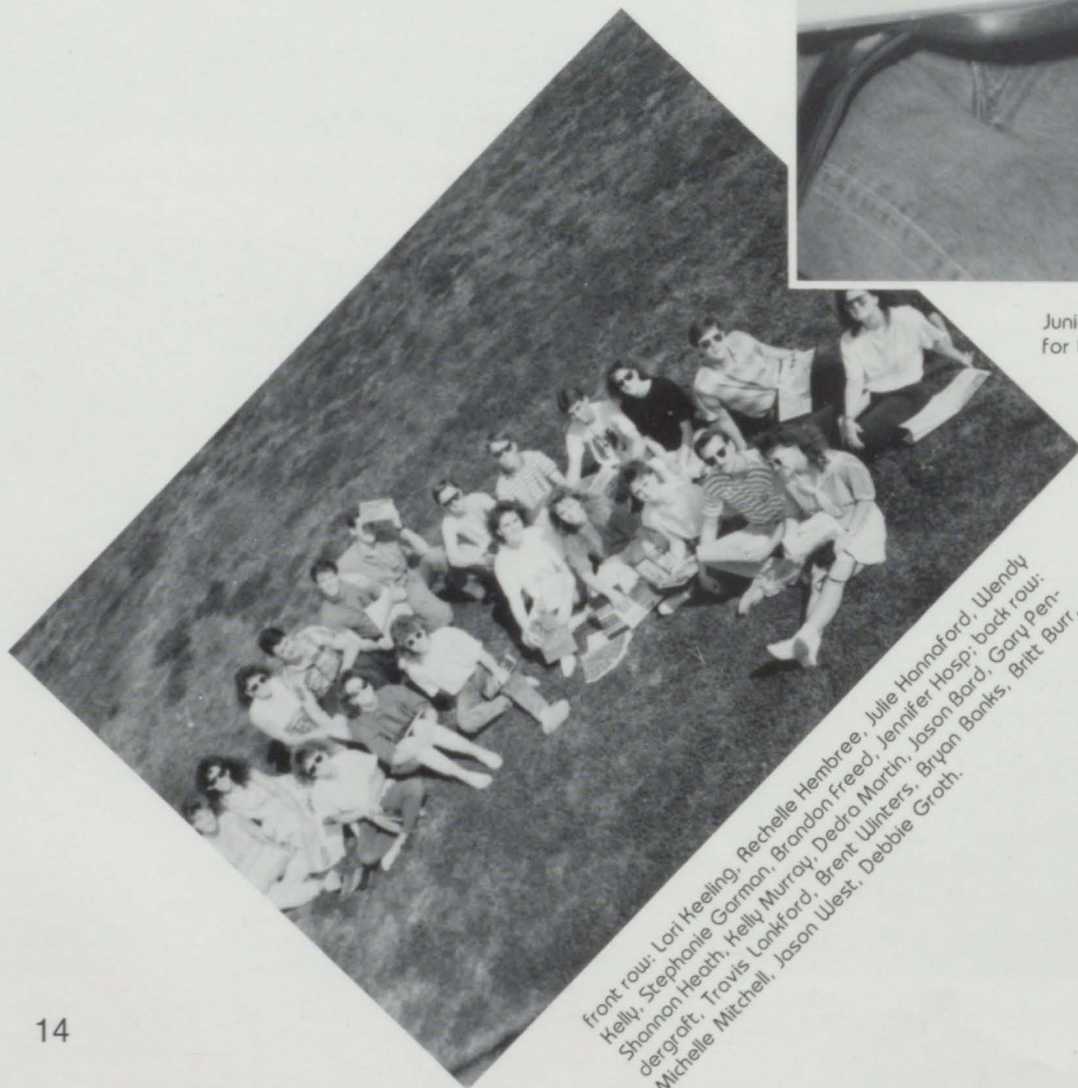
MOCCASIN PRINT AND WARRIOR

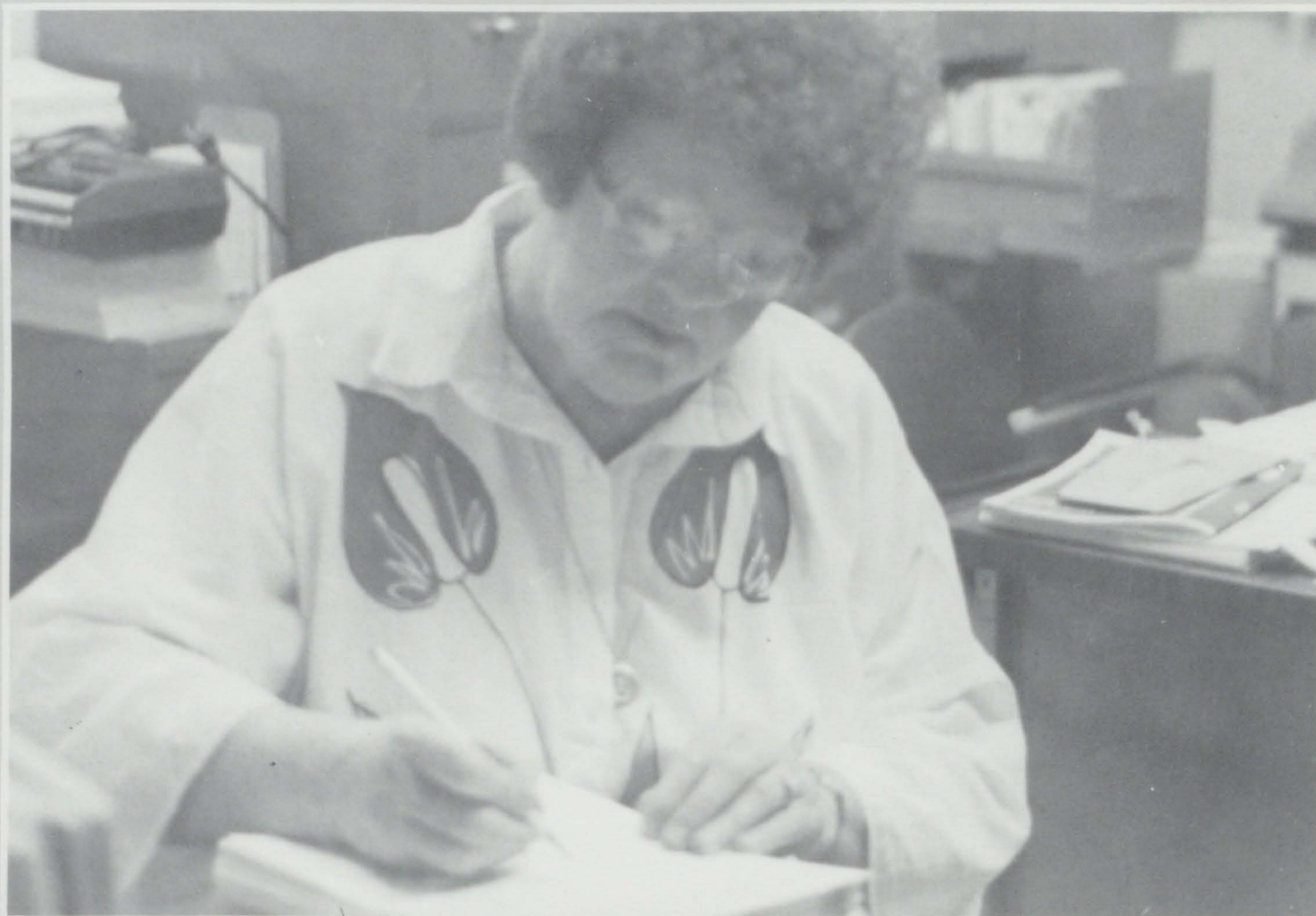

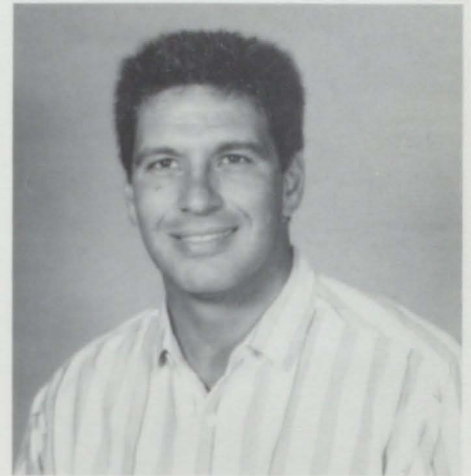

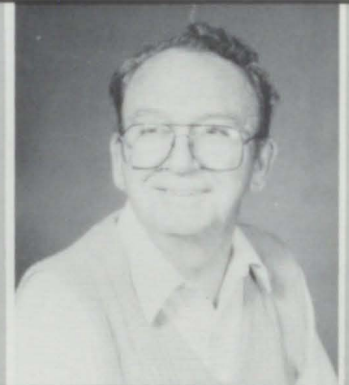
Southerland Retires after 41 Years

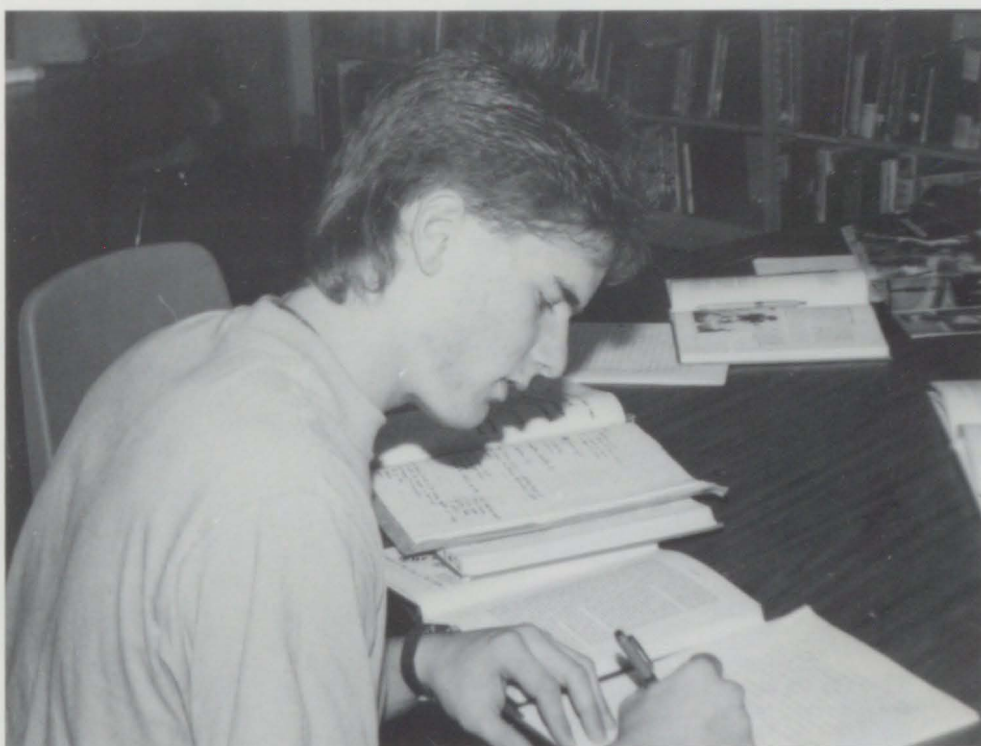
Sophomores Study Habits Change

concession stands to raise money for the Junior-Senior Prom, decorating for Homecoming as well as prom, and he must not forget keeping good grades and getting to class on time.

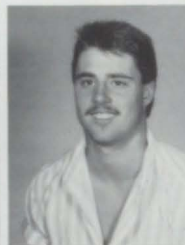
The class of 1990 did a superior job on working concession stands and decorating for Homecoming even though many of these students have after school or weekend jobs and other responsibilities.

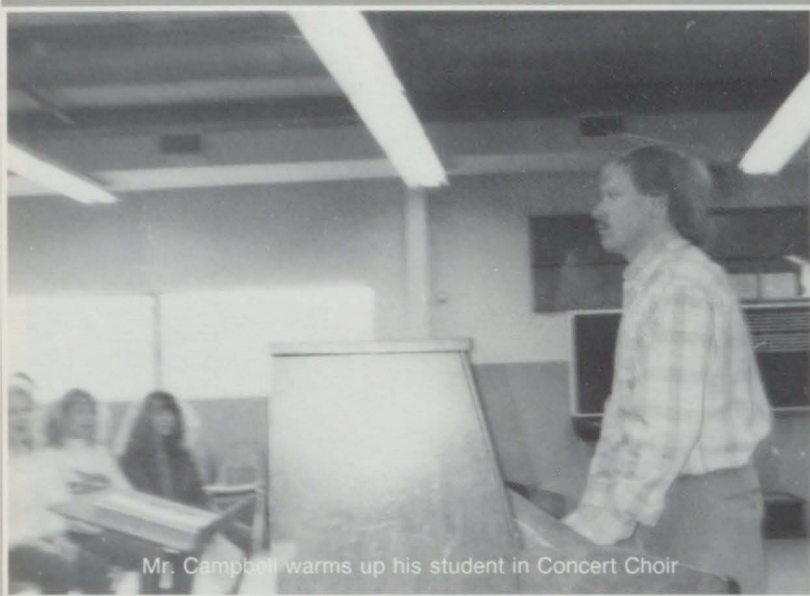

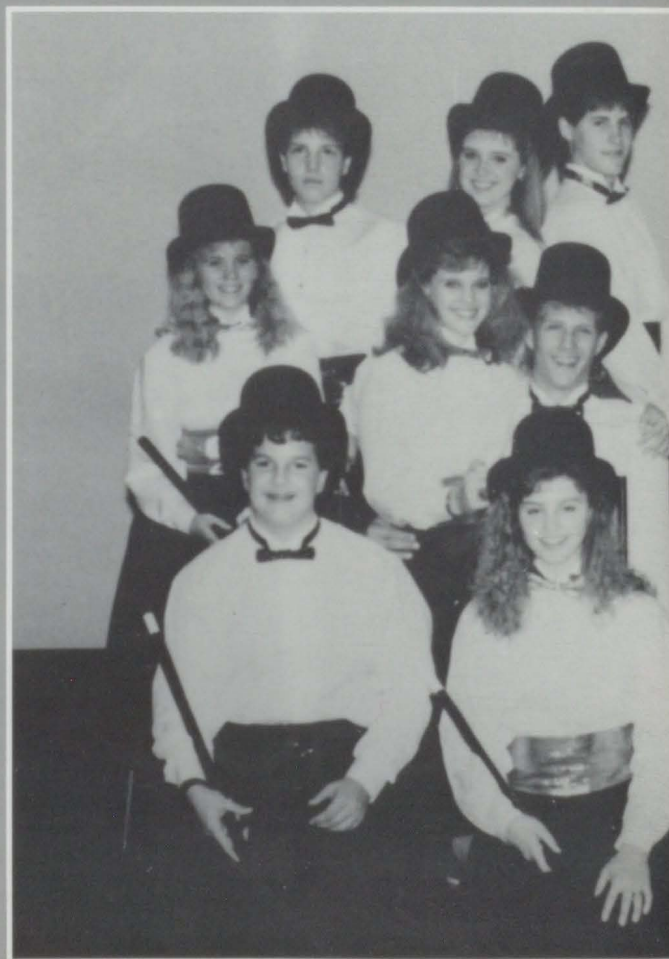

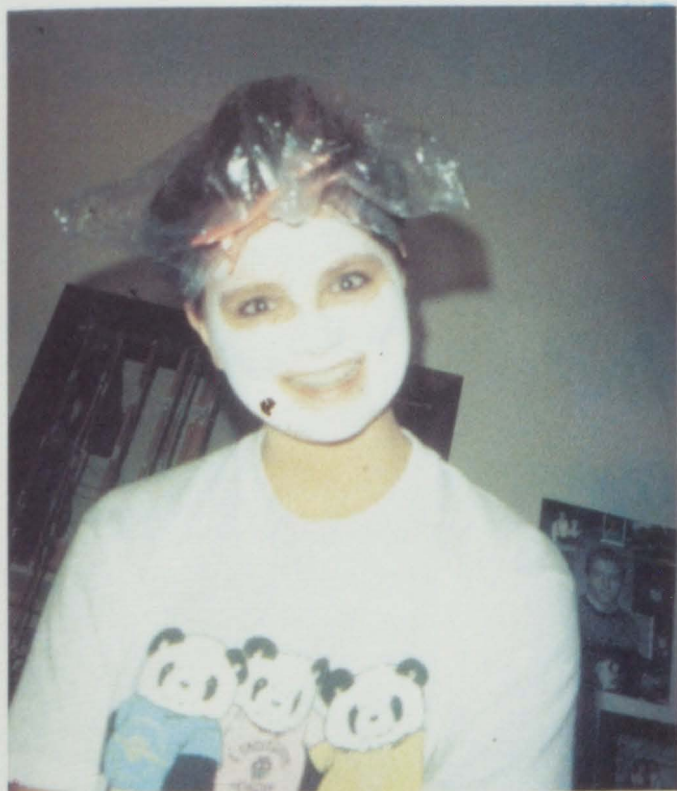

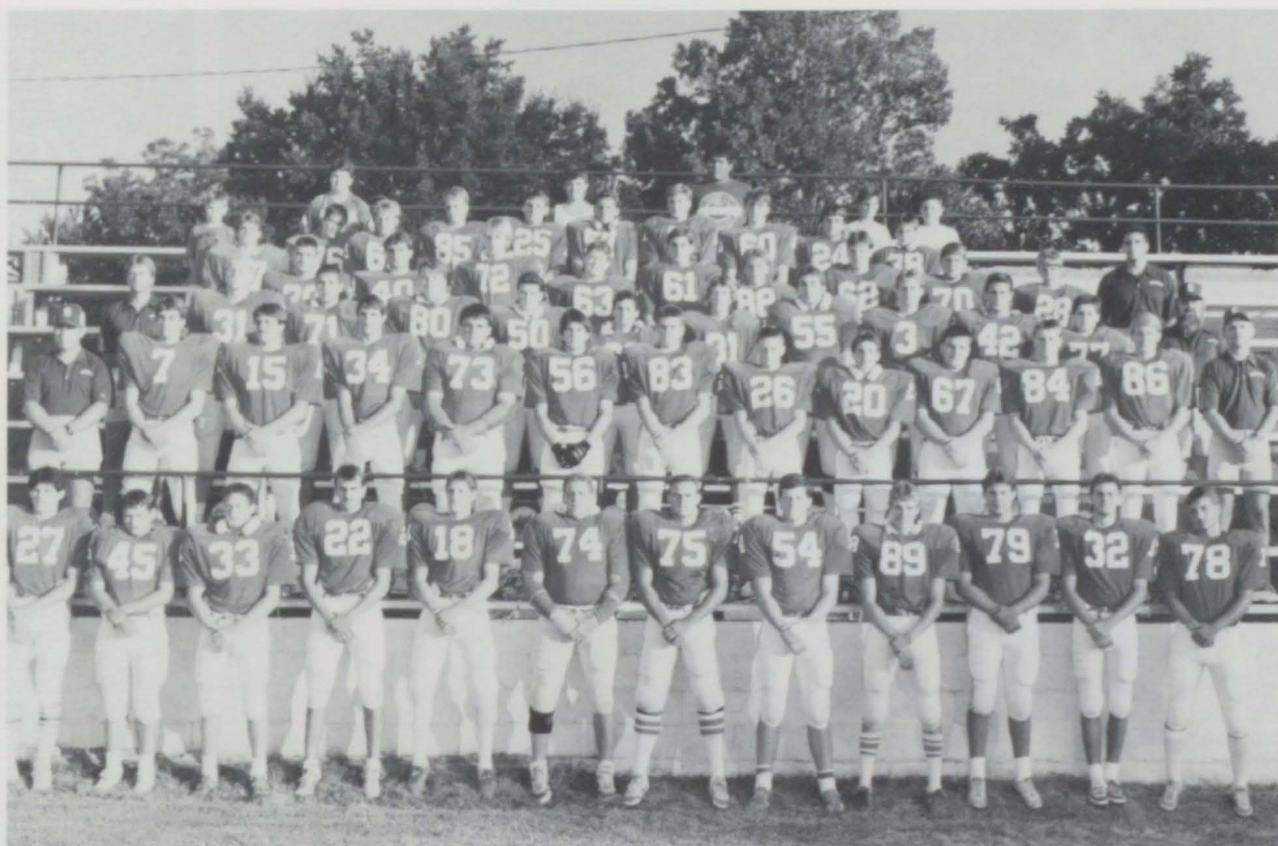

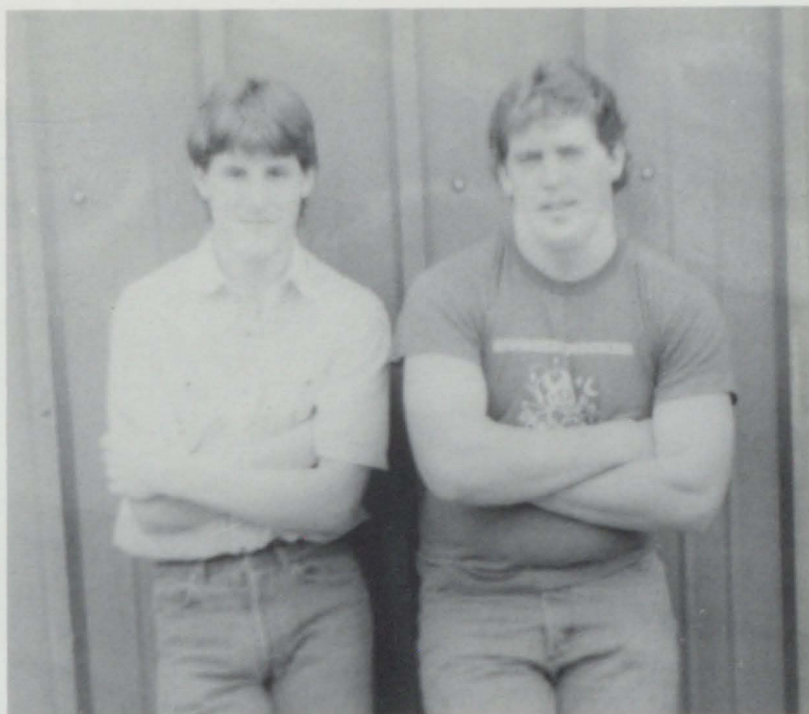

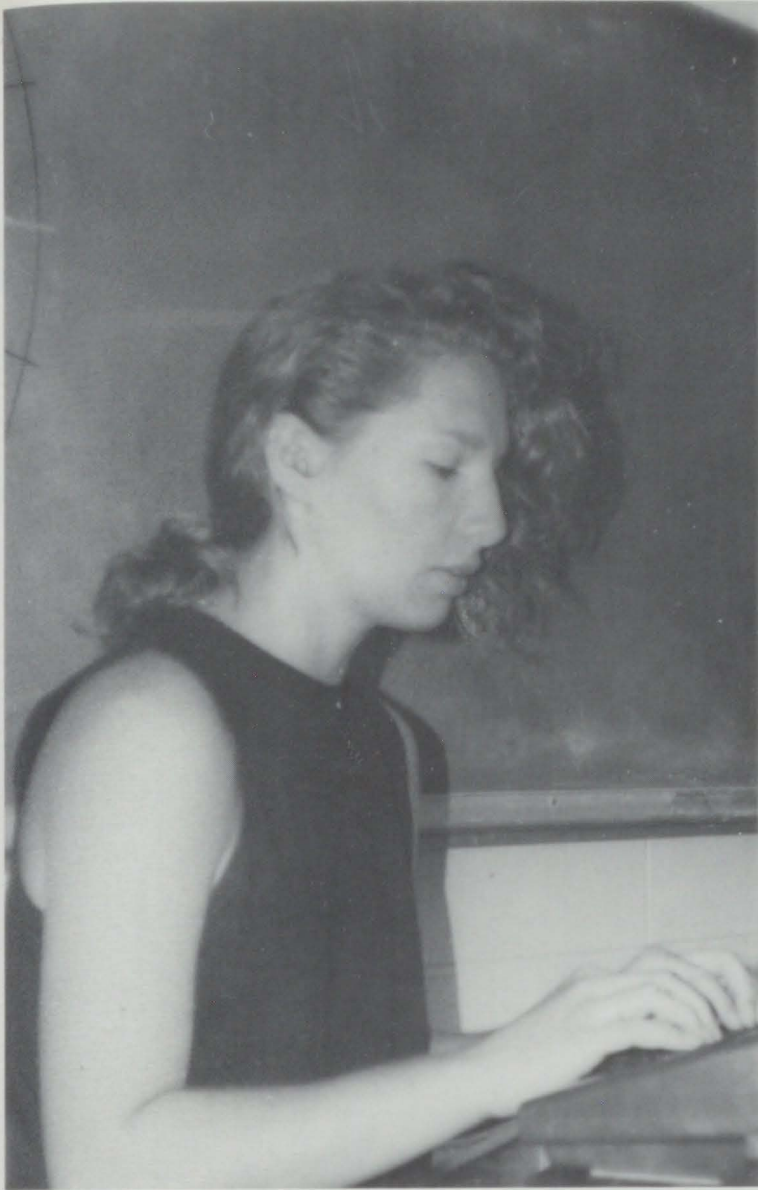

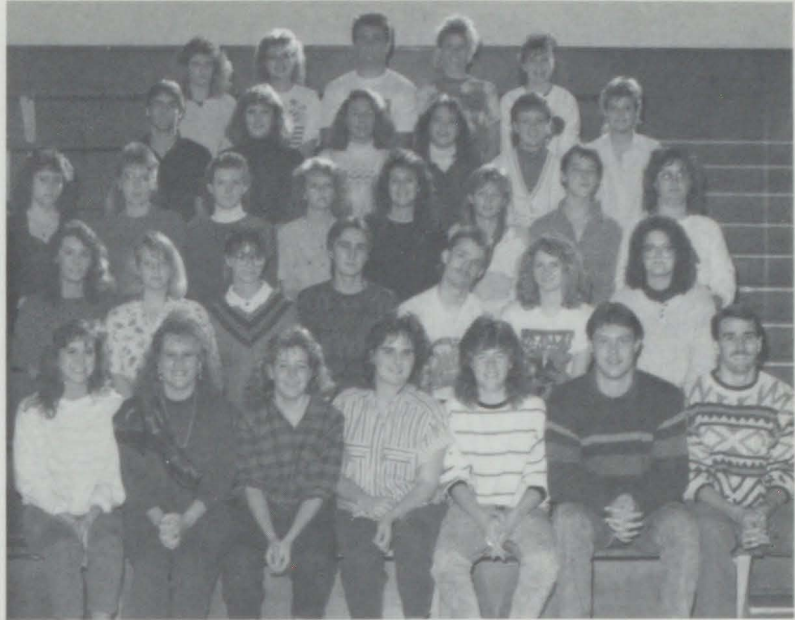

Eighty-six seniors graduated from Seneca High School on May 23, 1989. The ceremonies were held in the Earl Campbell Stadium.

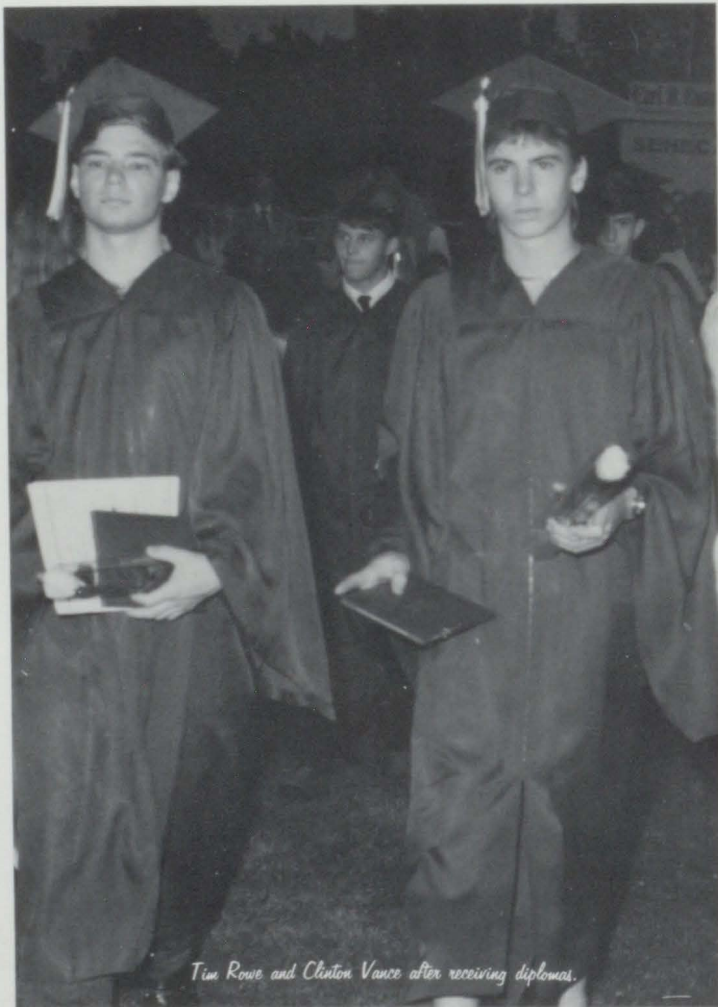
