The 1988-89 Bowl consisted of two opposing teams of four players each with a match lasting 20 minutes. The teams competed to see who had the most knowledge in the topics of government, history, current events, the arts, geography, language, literature, and general information. Mrs. Anne Shadwick, librarian, asked the questions and teachers served as judges, scorekeepers, and timekeepers.
