





Coach Lane and his assistant coaches worked out various plays with carefully drawn diagrams. Then, these plays were carried to the practice field.





put me into action in anything, in any way I desire.


I brings up to me this idea, that how you people progressed that fast and why you did. Altogether, I am really proud of it and to be for the people who made America that way.







Glass Menagerie"


The imaginative, enchanting story of a dilapidated Southern mother's efforts to marry off a daughter as fragile as the glass animals she collects was chosen as the first project of a newly-formed club, The National Thespians Society. It was "The Glass Menagerie," the first great success of Tennessee Williams, America's foremost living dramatist. Hailed by many as his most human and tender effort, the play was repeated for special performance during the annual Rotary Speech Tournament besides the other performances.

The four-character play concerns a mother's (Mickie Marble) attempts to mold her two children into an image that is in keeping with her own fantasy about herself. The son (John Graham) works in a warehouse and writes poetry on shoebox lids, and the crippled daughter (Helen Crouch) is too shy even to continue her studies at business school. Into the dingy flat, overlooking a back alley in St. Louis, comes the daughter's first Gentleman Caller—a big, goodnatured Irishman (John Rice) whom the mother has insisted that the son bring home to dinner to meet the sensitive girl. An embarrassing evening ensues, topped by the discovery that the Gentleman Caller is already engaged to be married.

Diary of Anne Frank

The "Diary of Anne Frank" is dramatization of the diary of a real girl, Anne Frank, who with her parents and others went into hiding in an attic in Amsterdam during World War II. Because they were Jews in a country occupied by the Nazis, they had reason to fear they would otherwise be sent to concentration camps and probably be killed. During the difficult days of confinement that ran into years, the adolescent Anne Frank wrote a diary that was later to arouse the wonderment and pity of the world. The "Diary of Anne Frank" was presented by the Neosho Drama Department, April 20, 21, and 22, at Neosho High School — the play was written by Albert Hackett and Frances Goodrich.








