





















In Search Of 🔅 🔅 🔅

Paula Allison: "He's hilarious! He tells you that you have homework due the next day when you really don't."


Brenda Offenbacker: "His bald head."

Connie Slaughter: ``When he gets embarrassed, his face gets really red.''




He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Pittsburg State University. His major was in math and his minor was in physical science. He received his Masters degree in mathematics.








Sophomores Enjoy A Special Year Filled With Spirit And Excitement . . .

Locks Stymie Neophytes .




Athletes Strive For Victory

Football Squads Tackle Another Season










Dream Comes True







Wrestlers Graple With Tough Year

















What's left to discover? Where are the Thomas Edisons, the Eli Whitneys, or the Herman Holleriths? What goals —

"Wait, Herman who?"

Ask friends and neighbors if they ever heard of Herman Hollerith, and ir will be unusual if anyone says "yes". But in Europe his name is remembered. Many technical articles refer to "the Hollerith System". Life the way we know it is due to this man; so who is he? Herman Hollerith, with his punch cards and electric rabulator, holds claim to the first working invention of modern information technology — he gave us the computer.

Hollerith's rabulator, with its built in adding machine was used to rabulate results for the 1890 census. People marveled at the speed and accuracy with which it performed, calculating the population of the U.S. in only six weeks, a job which had formerly taken years.

In 1911 Hollerith sold his Tabulating Machine Company. Thirteen years later the name was changed to International Business Machines Corporation, or IBM.

Compared to the computers of today, Hollerith's machine was big and cumbersome. Nevertheless, it gave the world a new age; The Computer Age.














The Future Teachers Of America Shines In Its First Year








This year was a new experience








Tennis Star Chooses Queen



Senior Assembly Honors Grads



Neosho High teaching staff will be missing two valuable members next year — Lowell Bland and Calvin Lane.



He remembers most the talents of the students and the excitment they had on "Snake Day". Mr. Bland recalls a pet owl they once had in the room. The owl would perch on the



shelves and watch everyone. One day the class was disecting crayfish and the owl snatched it's supper from the boy sitting in the front row.





Mr. Lane has raught physical education, social studies, and drivers' education during his thirtyfour years at Neosho High. He also coached football and served as athletic director during that time. Mr. Lane recalls an embarrassing moment on the football
