

















REMEMBER WHEN....



CLAY BROWN

Clay started youth Rodeos when he was in the 3rd grade. He won the AYRA junior All Around Cowboy when he was in the 7th grade. His freshman year he joined the Missouri High School Rodeo Team, which travels all over the state of Missouri. Hls first year in MHSR he won the Rookie of the Year. Clay finished in the top 5 at Barry Burks Jr. World Calf Roping in Ardmore, OK., this was roping against the top 150 high school ropers in the United States. Clay has been named MO Team Captain for the National High School Rodeo Association. Clay participates in Calf Roping, Team Roping, and Steer Wrestling. Clay and his family travel over 50,000 miles each year to attend rodeos and ropings. Clay has won over 30 buckles and a saddle, plus thousands of dollars in winnings.

CHRISTINA BULKLEY

Christina Bulkley has been performing in the field of fine arts for a total of nine years. She started dancing when she was seven years old and is currently performing for the Neosho Dance Academy with instructor Kristen Daniels. Christina is currently in Grade IV of Cecchetti. Cecchetti is a form of ballet that requires a dancer to take one hour performance/ memorizaiton exams in front of a board of Cecchetti Council of America members in order to move to the next level of this ballet. Cecchetti students must complete a total of five grades in order to be considered at the instructing levels. Since Christina has been in Cecchetti, she has been able to fly to Austin, Texas, and take one of her exams in which she received the second highest passing score in which a ballerina may acquire. 

All of this in turn develops into preset routines, called katas. Katas are self-defense routines hidden in dance form. We later were able to learn weapons after our ranking was higher. The ranking is based on the belt system in the following order: white, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple, red, brown, and black. There are ten degrees of black belt, of which the 6th thru 10th are based on honorary levels rather than physical skill levels. We have enjoyed karate and
























