"Inside" the Numbers & "Outside" the Classroom















Do you want to go to college but don't think you can afford it? Mrs. Shadwick has a solution that will pay your way through your first two years. The A+ Program pays your tuition at any public 2-year college, provided you have 95% attendance and a 3.5 GPA, and have performed 50 hours of tutoring through the Cadet Teaching program. "It's a good choice for those students who can't afford the cost of tuition right away," explained Mrs. Shadwick.

The A+ Program isn't the only service Seneca offers to help students get on their feet. The alternative school provides a haven for students struggling with academic and social problems. 























Seniors Voted Warrior Royalty




New Sports Continue To Thrive






"Tripped Out On The 12th Year"
